Department: NAGC News to Note Workgroup Convenes at NAGC

Concerns that the Common Core State Standards (CCSS) do not meet the needs of highly able learners prompted 10 NAGC volunteers to spend the weekend of February 3-5 focused on how to make appropriate modifications for gifted and talented students. The group of leaders, with special expertise in mathematics and English Language Arts, spent about 20 hours drafting the beginning of what will be two separate booklets for teachers on how they can modify the common core state standards (CCSS) in mathematics and English Language Arts for high ability and gifted students.

The practical books will address how to differentiate the standards and include specific examples at key grade levels for each strand of standards. The sections on professional development will urge gifted education professionals to take leadership roles in working with their schools and districts to emphasize the evidence-based differentiation practices that, as part of a professional development plan, would enable general and special education teachers to adapt, modify, or replace curriculum in the CCSS framework based on the needs of the individual learner.

Also helpful to gifted education coordinators and math and language arts curriculum and instruction leaders, the books will be ready for release at NAGC's 59th Convention in Denver.
