


Strategies for Cancer Prevention - Free Webinar

'Kicking Cancer Out of Your Community: Strategies for Cancer Prevention' on 9/18 Public Health Live

Suzanne Kuon, M.S., director of cancer control policy initiatives at the New York State Department of Health (DOH), will present “Kicking Cancer Out of Your Community: Strategies for Cancer Prevention” at the next Public Health Live webcast, to be held from 8-9 a.m. Thurs., Sept. 18.

Her co-presenters are Glynnis S. Hunt, M.S., of Schenectady County Public Health Services and Mary McFadden, C.P.H., of the Broome County Health Department.



Their program will highlight three cancer prevention initiatives implemented and evaluated by Schenectady County and Broome County.

Cancer prevention and control activities in DOH are guided by the 2012–2017 NYS Comprehensive Cancer Control Plan (the Plan) and the NYSDOH Prevention Agenda. Cancer prevention and early detection are priority goal areas of the Plan.

DOH began supporting implementation of the Plan strategies specific to cancer prevention in January 2013 through two community demonstration projects. These projects seek to mobilize communities to support strategies that focus on policy, system, and environmental (PSE) changes to reduce the risk of cancer among community residents. The project work plans are built around four key activities:

1. Educating and engaging communities,
2. Mobilizing and empowering communities,
3. Engaging organizational decision makers, and
4. Educating governmental decision makers.

The course is approved for one Continuing Nurse Education contact hour and one AMA PRA Category 1 Credits. Physicians should claim credit commensurate with the extent of their participation in the activity. The program is designated for Certified Health Education Specialists (CHES) and/or Master Certified Health Education Specialists (MCHES) to receive up to 1.0 total Category I contact education contact hours.
